THE TIME BETWEEN THE YEARS - A True Story



In Germany they call it *die Zeit zwischen den Jahren*, those days between Christmas and New Year. The old year is all but over, the new one yet to come. Time hangs suspended, time out of time, and never more so than in 1999 as the world held its breath, waiting for a new millennium to dawn.

From my kitchen where I was preparing dinner, I could see into the living room where Jim and Lilian were sitting on the sofa, holding hands. Jim, my father, was eighty-four and Lilian must have been at least eighty, but she said a lady should never mention her age. My mother had died after long years of illness, not an easy time for my father who had cared for her devotedly. Six months after her death he had met Lilian, a widow living in the retirement flat above his own.

Lilian reminded me of my mother in that she rarely stopped talking. In the car she would tell you amazing things like who invented the cat's eyes in the road, or that you were passing the church where Byron was buried. Jim loved her lively chatter, and her bubbly sense of humour brought a smile to his face that I had not thought to see again. When we asked him to our home in Germany to celebrate Christmas and the Millennium, it was natural that Lilian should be invited too.

I put the dish into the oven and joined them in the living room. While I was pouring glasses of sherry, I caught them exchanging glances.

"Lilian has something to ask you," my father said.

"I was wondering, if it's not too much trouble and you haven't got anything else planned," Lilian began tentatively, in the manner of a woman who had always put her late husband's wishes and then her sons' about a thousand miles before her own. She paused, and Jim squeezed her hand in encouragement. "I have a pen-friend whom I've had since I was a girl. She doesn't live far from Hamburg. I'd love to go and see her while we're here." She looked up at me hopefully.

"Of course," I said. "Where does she live?"

"In a place called Tönning on the west coast of Schleswig-Holstein. About an hour and a half by car from here," Jim answered. He had clearly had the map out.

"Sounds like a nice trip for you all." My husband had entered the room. "I'll stay here and hold the fort. See to the dog and all that," he added congenially. I knew then who would be driving.

"Tell us more about your German pen-friend," I said to Lilian when we were seated at the dinner table. "When did you last see her?"

"I didn't," she replied. "That's the point. We've never met, and she isn't German either. She's Estonian, and her name is Dagmar, though I always call her Teddy. We got each other's addresses through our schools when we were twelve years old. She wanted to practise her English and we've been writing to each other ever since."

"But why haven't you ever met?" I asked.

"Our paths just didn't cross. There was the war, and of course travel hasn't always been as cheap and easy as it is now. But I suppose the main reason is that we both loved writing letters. I think it's an art that's dying out nowadays. Phone calls aren't the same, so we've never spoken on the telephone either. Through our letters we've become very close and shared each other's lives though mine was very dull compared to hers. My parents were poor, but I had a normal, happy childhood. Dagmar's father was a director of the Tallin opera house, but when she was a baby, he was murdered by the Bolsheviks. Her mother brought her up alone."

"And you never wanted to see each other in seventy years?" I felt I had to find out more.

"We made a pact we'd never meet. We felt we were sisters in spirit, and wanted to stay that way."

"What has made you change your mind?" I asked. "Perhaps Dagmar will be upset if you break your agreement now."

"I've thought about that, but I'm so worried that something has happened to her. She hasn't answered any of my letters this year. I wrote to Hans in October, but he hasn't replied either."

"Hans is Dagmar's husband?"

"Yes, he's her second husband. She married him in the fifties. He's very good to her, but he isn't the man that Teddy truly loved. That was the greatest secret she shared with me. When the Russians marched into Estonia again in 1940, Dagmar and her mother were terrified. She married a German colleague so she could get German nationality. They divorced soon after, but then she had documents to get herself and her mother to Germany. On the train journey she met an Estonian student called Boris. She told me it was love at first sight. They got engaged in Berlin, but in 1944 Boris was sent to the Russian front. She never heard what happened to him." Lilian's voice faltered, and my father placed a comforting hand on her arm.

"How long did she stay in Berlin?" my husband asked.

"In April 1945 she was working in an office outside the city when the Russians advanced to two kilometres away. She told me that she ran through a burning wood to escape, but she couldn't get back into Berlin to save her mother. She managed to reach Lübeck where she was safe because the British were there, but her mother later died of starvation in the Russian sector of Berlin."

For a while none of us spoke.

"Tell us about her. What is she like?" I asked.

"She's beautiful, at least in her photos she was. Tall and slim with dark hair and big brown eyes. And she's very clever, especially at languages. I've kept all her cards and letters, everything she's sent me over the years. She often wrote how much our friendship meant to her, how much it helped her in the darkest times." Lilian paused, and her fingers tightened on the stem of her wine glass. "I've just got to know what's happened to her now."

"We'll go there tomorrow and find out," I promised.

Though it was only mid-afternoon, darkness had fallen when we left the motorway and drove west towards the coast. Huge, wet snowflakes came swirling towards us to splatter onto the windscreen then slither away as the wipers swished them aside. Rolling banks of fog were swelling in from the sea, swallowing the headlights of the car, sucking us into a black vortex. The wind had risen, howling as it swept across the treeless landscape. I leaned forward, peering into the gloom to make out the contours of the road that snaked ahead. Then, all at once, we were there. I drew up in front of an unpretentious house.

"You go with Lilian so you can translate," my father said. "I'll wait here in the car."

A solitary street lamp lighted the rusty gate. Unpruned roses barred our way up the narrow path, showering us with drops of rain like icy tears. I pressed the tarnished brass bell beside the door, and deep inside the house we heard it ring. The windows remained in darkness. I pressed once more. A light appeared behind the glass panel in the door. There was the sound of slow footsteps in the hallway and then a bolt being drawn back. An elderly man stood before us, small and stooping.

"Hans?" I asked, before I remembered I was in Germany and addressed him by his full name.

He nodded wordlessly. I introduced Lilian and myself and asked if we might speak to his wife.

He did not seem surprised that we had come. "I'm afraid that's not possible," he said sadly. Although he spoke in German, Lilian tensed beside me.

"I'm sorry we've come unexpectedly. Perhaps we could just say hello?" I pleaded.

"I'll ask." He shuffled away. After a minute he was back. "All right," he almost whispered. "But don't tire her."

He led us to a tiny sitting room, stuffed with furniture and stiflingly hot. When my eyes had become accustomed to the gloom, I saw a tall woman lying on a couch. She was so thin that the blankets barely rose to cover her. Her skin was taut like yellow parchment over her high cheekbones, dark circles ringed her sunken eyes and her long, grey hair spread uncombed on her pillow, yet I realized how beautiful she must have been. With a great effort she raised one arm and reached out.

"Lily!"

"Teddy!"



They didn't throw themselves into each other's arms with hugs and tears. In fact, they touched just once when Lilian grasped Dagmar's outstretched hand. Then she released it and took a seat, but their eyes never left each other's faces. Is it that their generation, the war generation, has seen so much that makes them so unshakeable? Or did they find each other's physical presence so unaccustomed that they chose to revert to words again?

Hans and I withdrew to the kitchen. "She's very ill," he confided to me in German as he made me tea. "It won't be long. I couldn't write and tell Lilian. My English isn't good enough, and Dagmar wouldn't let me."

When we went back into the room, Lilian was sitting where we had left her. She was still wearing her winter coat and her white fur cap, her curls peeping out beneath it like a silver halo. Her pink cheeks were glowing with health, her blue eyes shining. Then Dagmar turned her head and spoke to me for the first and only time.

"She is so lovely." That's all she said, four words in English, and they were true, in every respect.

Suddenly Dagmar seemed exhausted. She closed her eyes as we took our leave. Lilian pressed her hand. "Goodbye, Teddy dear," was all she said. Her voice was firm and under control.

Back in the car, I glanced at the clock as I turned the ignition key. Our visit had lasted seventeen minutes. Seventeen minutes for seventy years of friendship. While I drove I could hear my father and Lilian talking softly in the back, her low voice, his understanding murmurs, a quiet sob and the rustle of a paper handkerchief.

When Lilian spoke my name, her voice was steady. "Thank you for taking me there today," she said quite formally. "You don't know how much this has meant to me." A moment's silence followed before she spoke again. "If I gave you my letters from Dagmar, would you write a book about her? I think her story should be told. I'd like you to do it."

"I'm not sure I can," I answered. "It's such a tremendous responsibility, writing about another person's life. I really don't know if I'm up to it."

"Say you'll think about it, please."

"All right," I said. "But don't you think you should ask Dagmar first?"

There was a pause before Lilian spoke.

"I'm never going to hear from her again."

She never did.

Only a few days later, Hans rang to tell me that Dagmar had passed away.

Now, 21 years on, my father has long passed away too. Lilian is 102 years old and has just moved into a care home near her sons. When she writes to me, she thanks me for taking her to see her friend that day. She believes that friendship between women is stronger than war and expulsion, death and loss, sickness and a pandemic.

It is that belief I would like to share with you.

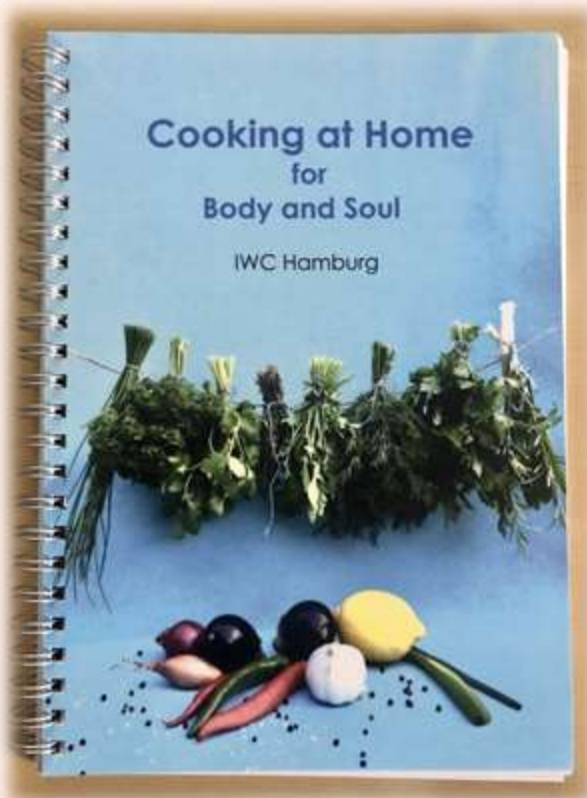

Dear WCI ladies,

We wish to extend our best wishes to all of you in this New Year. May you all be able to reach all your goals for this year and that you and your members will stay safe during this worldwide pandemic.

Here at VIA Lebanon International Club, we have had to face enormous challenges last year and as things look, this year also. Starting in November, all our social gatherings have been canceled time and time again because of the social unrest, protests, and COVID lockdowns.

As an NGO, we started the year by contributing with monetary help to two NGOs operating in the country. We helped Ayadina, an NGO that helps marginal children and elderly by contributing with meals to the elders in their care and we donated money to the Cancer Center, an organization that encompasses all the aid services to cancer patients in Beirut. After October, we have not been able to meet and make future plans.

Unlike other countries, Lebanon is facing not only the COVID pandemic but also an economic collapse, a government that is on hold and barely functioning, and we are still dealing with the nuclear blast at the port of Beirut that killed and made many homeless. We want to help, but we need a quorum, which implies meeting and signing in person, which we have not been able to do. Since we are an International club and most of our members are foreigners, because of the situation some members have left and we expect many more to follow in the months ahead.

These are difficult times for long-established clubs and NGOs in Lebanon, so much so for a one like ours that has just barely begun. We are basically not functioning as an NGO and because of the dire economic situation in the country; we are trying to just keep the members abreast by connecting with them with articles in our monthly newsletter and with each other through our WhatsApp.

We have asked our members to share their talents: their professional skills, their hobbies, and ideas with each other through articles, videos, and blogs that we incorporated in our newsletters. This connection with our members has been a lifeline for them all. It has helped them share their anxieties and worries about the country and the pandemic and helped them remain calm and united. It is all we can do at the present time. We planned and still are planning a lot of tours and outings, but we keep canceling due to the situation we are living through. Thanks to social media, and our member's spontaneous collaboration we remain active.

We would like to say we have had events and tell you all about them, but unfortunately, we have little to say. We are starting our third lockdown this week for the next three weeks. Hopefully, by then, we will have something positive to share with you. In the meantime, please let us know how you are connecting with your members. We covet your prayers this year for Lebanon's future stability and the eradication of this pandemic throughout the world. Stay Safe.

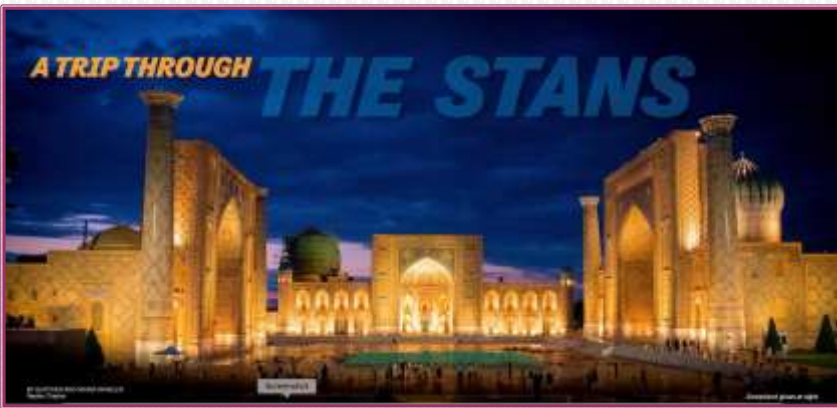
WELCOME TO FLORIDA INTERNATIONAL CLUB

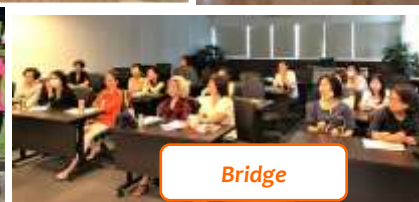

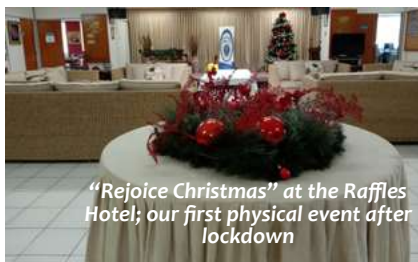

Marian, Eshrat and the Great Idea

My initial association with Welcome Clubs began in London, England, where my husband and I lived at the time. I became a member of Welcome to London through an acquaintance who sponsored me. I so enjoyed my membership with the club that when we returned home to Annapolis, Maryland, in 1989, my membership was transferred to Welcome to Washington.

Shortly after my return, WTW hosted a conference in Washington. It was then that I met Marian Adair during a bus trip to Charlottesville, Virginia. I was sitting at the back of the bus when a very distinguished and beautiful lady approached me, introduced herself and sat next to me. She and I spoke in length getting to know one another. When she learned that I had served on the group that produced a monthly publication for the London membership, she shared with me how she was working on creating an umbrella organisation to bring all the clubs in Europe to unite together in advancing the basic principle of "Friendship & Understanding" among women of all cultures. She asked me to assist her in communicating between the leadership of those clubs. This endeavor led me to become involved with WCI, where I served over the years in different capacities on the Executive Committee.

In 2000, I was elected as President of WCI. Marian congratulated me and asked what my agenda was to advance its goals. I shared, with trepidation, my two goals, one of which was to take WCI's message of "Friendship and Understanding" onto the World Stage where it belonged. Secondly, to become financially independent. Her next question, to my surprise, was not to discourage me, but to explain how I hoped to achieve it. Luckily, I had on my committee an individual who had the contacts that were needed to approach the United Nations.

During my three-year term, I pursued my goal in many ways. I addressed it at Conferences and Board Meetings and even wrote about the issue in an article for the Worldwide Link. I concluded that this was a long-term goal, and only through perseverance, the right connections and at the right time, this could become a reality.

Great Ideas Wait for the Right People to Come Along

In 2002, at the Taipei Conference, I became acquainted with Athenia Kuo, a highly respected member of her club. Over the years, we developed a close friendship. During one of our many conversations by phone, Athenia shared with me that in the next few weeks, she was taking part as a delegate of Dr. Jungsook Kim of South Korea, who held a prominent position at the United Nations. It was through this introduction that WCI acquired both a club in Seoul and a contact to the United Nations.

In the meantime, we were in the process of electing the next President of WCI. Maria Fernanda Arduino, whom I had met in 2008 at the conference in San Diego, expressed her interest in the position. However, she requested the Chair of the Nominating Committee, to speak with me prior to making her commitment. Maria Fernanda and I spoke, and when asked, I shared with her the then current status of WCI. Furthermore, I shared what I foresaw as my vision that WCI's message rightly belonged on the World Stage. In addition to that, WCI needed to adopt "Education" as an initiative which was very relevant in the world we lived in.

In 2016, Maria Fernanda was elected as President of WCI. In December of 2016, Dr. Kim established "Welcome to Korea" as member of WCI. She held the first anniversary of the club in November of 2017, which Maria Fernanda attended as President of WCI. The subject of the United Nations was brought up and Dr. Kim graciously offered her support. In March of 2018, Maria Fernanda and I were invited to the United Nations by Dr. Kim as members of her delegation to ECOSOC and the Commission on the Status of Women. Needless to say, it was awe-inspiring.

Our deepest gratitude goes to everyone, namely Dr. Kim, Athenia and Maria Fernanda. The application was submitted in 2018 and officially accepted in 2020.
