ANGLO-GERMAN INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S ASSOCIATION

TOUR OF THE ORGANS OF THE ST. PETRI CHURCH, HAMBURG



Organised by our member Ingeborg Kruse, nearly 40 AGIWA members and guests braved the cold, wet and windy February weather and were rewarded with an outstanding event when Thomas Dahl, Director of Church Music, took us on a guided tour of the organs of the St. Petri church in Hamburg.

We began at the small organ in the choir with its 1,500 wooden and metal pipes.

Mr. Dahl not only showed us how the stops can be pulled to open the valves in the pipes and how the shades above the keys can be tilted to soften the sound, but also played various pieces of music to demonstrate this. It was fascinating to see how he used both his hands and his feet to play, and to hear that organists wear special shoes.

From there we progressed to a chest organ, not much larger than a piano, at the front of the nave. Built in Holland in 1212 but in the traditional manner, this organ is used for baroque oratorios and chamber music. Mr. Dahl showed us how he is able to play it and conduct the choir at the same time. We also learned that pipe organs, though far more expensive, are a better investment than electronic organs in the long run.

The highlight of our visit came when we climbed the stairs to the largest organ with its 4,725 pipes of up to five and a half metres in length. It was built in 1955 by Rudolf von Beckerath who incorporated 20 stops from an organ dating from 1855 to produce a unique sound suited for accompanying hymns of Dutch and North German origin. Mr. Dahl showed us the five divisions of the organ which can be played in dialogue, and various stops that produce the sounds of instruments like flutes, oboes and trumpets. Before a concert, stops can be programmed electronically so nowadays an organist does not need an assistant.

Mr. Dahl literally pulled out all the stops to play Bach for us - a wonderful experience! All present showed their appreciation by making a generous donation to the church music fund at the close of our visit.

This was AGIWA's last major event before the shutdown due to COVID-19. We are all looking forward to when we can restart our activities and events.

A little over a year ago, we were very thrilled and excited to launch our first Women's Lounge event. With the support of our President, Ulrike Westermann, our Club Board and our newly formed WCI Committee, we were able to successfully implement this new activity, resulting in better understanding of WCI and at the same time fulfilling its mission of Friendship through Education.



What is the main idea behind the Women's Lounge? The main concept of Women's Lounge is to have an interactive exchange of ideas and information on topics that are interesting or/of interest to our members. It is to bring WCI's Education Initiative "internally" - that is, within our Club life. Our vision was to have a casual, informal discussion over a cup of coffee or tea where our Members can talk freely and listen to one another. The

Secondly, we explored the topic of "Aging." How is Aging seen in their own cultures? What is the concept of beauty in relation to aging? We had a lively discussion, concluding that we had more in common than we thought.

In addition, we had a great chance to have a three-part series on Conflict and Mediation -- led by Dr. Imke Wulfmeyer, a lawyer and a certified mediator. She gave us better understanding on how to handle Conflicts through effective communication and how to succeed in Mediating. In turn, we shared our personal experiences on how Conflicts and Mediations are handled based on our own cultural backgrounds.



What do we hope to accomplish in the Women's Lounge? Education is teaching and learning! Maria Fernanda once said, "we are all life-long learners." I hope that through our Women's Lounge activities, we can give our members a casual and comfortable place to express and share their rich and unique knowledge and wisdoms and the opportunity to continue to cultivate their curiosities and enthusiasms in learning

I look forward to more Women's Lounge events, hopefully very soon, so that we can continue to enlighten our members with interesting topics relevant to our ever changing world.
