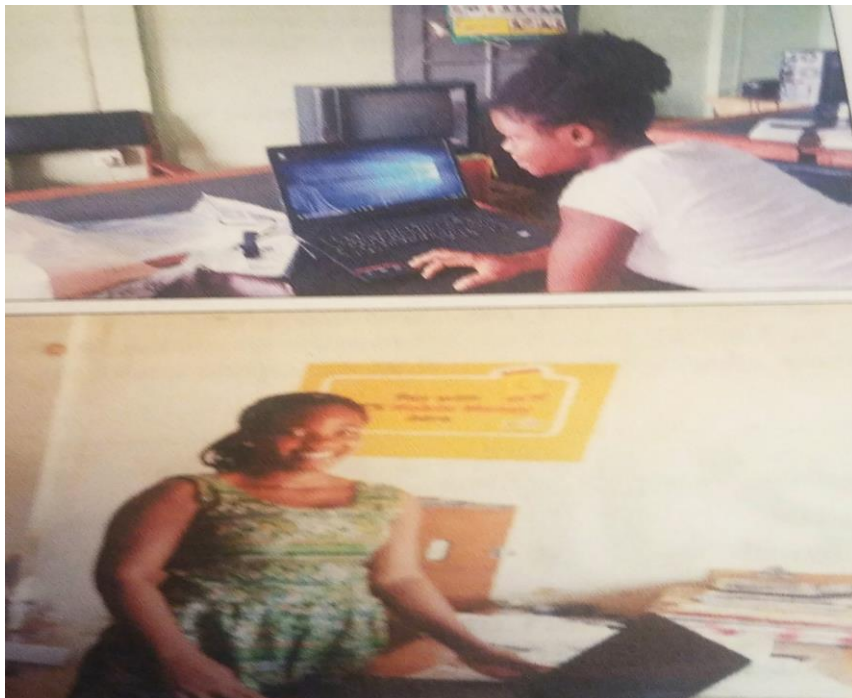

An End of the Year Party with a Special Lecture Adieu 2017~

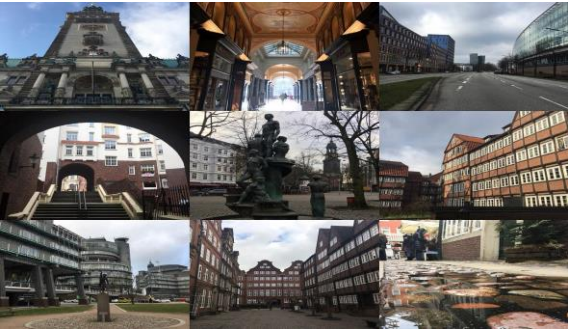

IWCP CELEBRATES FRIEDA LEFEVER'S 103RD BIRTHDAY

Members of the Philadelphia International Women's Club gathered on Friday, March 23rd to celebrate the 103rd birthday of member Frieda Lefever. Frieda was born Frieda Graumann on March 21, 1915 in Wissek, Germany on the same day her father was wounded in the First World War. She grew up and was a nurse in the Jewish hospital in Berlin on Kristallnacht, November 9, 1938, when she and her family were forced to flee Germany.

Frieda ended up on the East Coast of the US, married a fellow German and eventually started her own business in the New York City area. On November 24, 1948, she married Hans Lefaber in New York City. On July 19, 1954 they had a child, a daughter they named Hope. Frieda's husband died in December of 1975 and she remained in the New York area until she retired and moved to the Philadelphia area to be closer to Hope.

At the request of her son in law, Howard, she moved in with her daughter and her two grandchildren, Rachel and Dana. She subsequently attended the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Art where studied painting and earned a fine arts degree at the age of eighty three. In 2003 Frieda wrote and published her autobiography, FRIEDA'S JOURNEY.

Frieda still drives, shops daily, prepares meals for Howard and Hope. She attends Pilate classes and paints. She is an inspiration to everyone in the IWCP, as well as all others who know her.

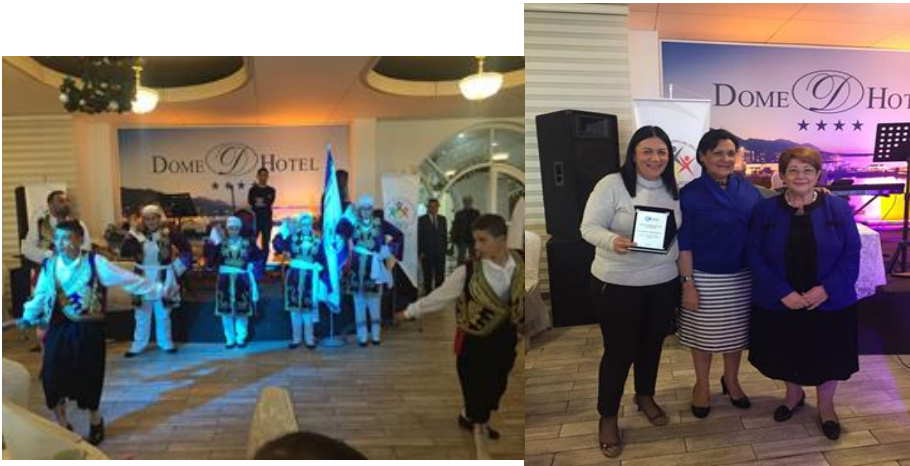


Dog. More than 110 members and guests attended.

GUIDED WALKING TOUR - 'HAMBURG'S HISTORIC STAIRCASES'

We will follow our guide Karin Karsten-Licht on her two-hour English-language walking tour around the historic office buildings in the Hamburg city centre, featuring the most amazing and elaborate staircases, which, unless you go inside these buildings, you never think they would exist.

Around 1900, lots of office buildings, the so-called Kontorhäuser, were constructed. Their entrance calls were

supposed to put visitors/clients into the right, positive, mood for doing business, which may explain why they were designed in such an extraordinarily elaborate way. Facades with Art-Nouveau elements and staircases with interesting wall tiles still amaze us to this day. The painted ceiling of the Mellin-Passage was only discovered following a fire in the former Vegetarian restaurant. The ABC-Bogen on the other hand is an example for a Kontorhaus built in modern times. We will end our tour at a café, where those of you who have time, can stop for a coffee and cake or a glass of wine.
