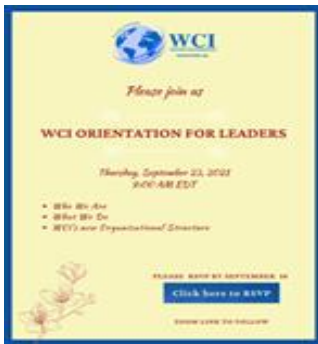

INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S CLUB OF PHILADELPHIA

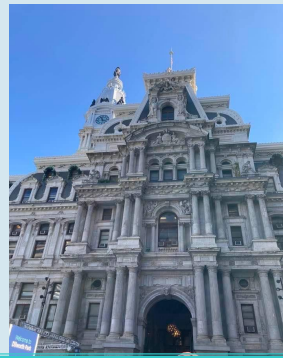

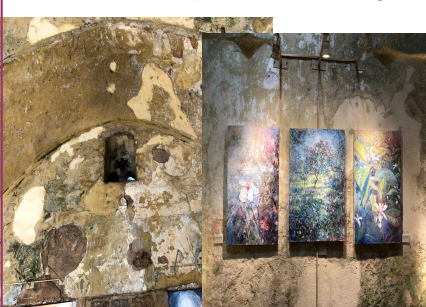

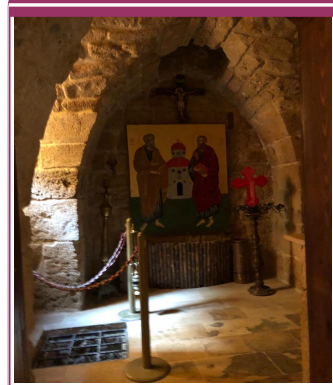

WELCOME TO FLORIDA INTERNATIONAL CLUB

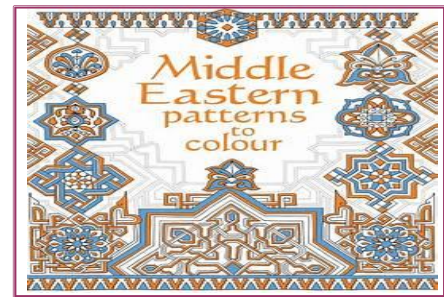

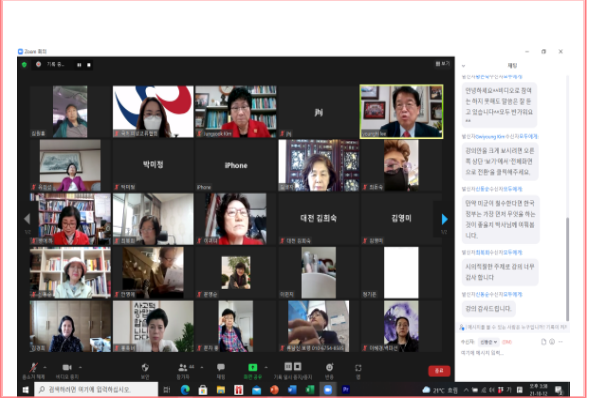

WELCOME TO KOREA INTERNATIONAL CLUB

Online Special Lecture on the Afghanistan Situation and Impact on Women

On Tuesday, October 12th, 2021, Welcome to Korea International Club (WKIC) held a special lecture on the situation in Afghanistan, focusing on the impact on women. Specialist Dr. Choonkun Lee gave a speech through Zoom for an hour. Approximately 40 members participated. The main focus was how the political situation changes the lives of women and the people around them. Additionally, Dr. Lee covered the historic background of the present situation and the significance of the military withdrawal based on various facts. Participants were particularly eager to know the contrast between Korea and Afghanistan. WKIC is trying to extend the pursuit of lifelong education to the general public and this on-line digital platform proved to be effective for that purpose.



Historic Tour to Changgyeongung Palace



In the history, Changgyeong Palace was designed primarily as a residence for elders of the royal family to live during the Joseon Dynasty (1392-1910). We found that Changgyeong Palace originally had no garden of its own because the residents shared the garden behind Changdeok Palace. The two compounds were directly connected. 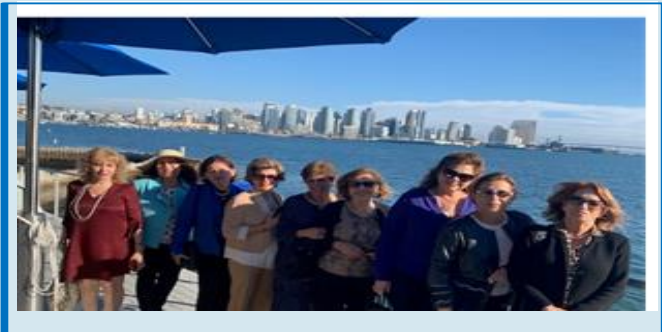
