

VACCINATION

The Indonesian government does not require foreigners to receive vaccinations before entering, except when traveling to Papua where it is mandatory to travel with Malaria tablets. However, it is advised that you check with your national health agency and follow the guidelines of your country or district concerning vaccinations and boosters.

If you have a pre-existing health condition and are at risk for certain illnesses, it is also advisable to talk to your family doctor about the recommended vaccinations for your particular case before travelling. In the U.S., for example, this is done through a primary health care provider who may send you to a specialist. For other countries, finding out what is required is advised. This is a precautionary step and should be made 8 weeks prior to travel to Indonesia.

WEATHER

Indonesia is located on the equator and is categorized as a tropical country. Tropical countries have 2 seasons - rainy and dry. Particularly in Java and Bali, the wet season is from November to March and the dry season from April to October. In June, we do not expect much rain. The average temperature in June ranges from 23° - 32° degrees Celsius or 84° - 94° Fahrenheit, and the humidity ranges between 70%-90%.
